Moving on from Employability Hubs







Introduction

When you finish your Employability Hub you should have all the skills you need to go into employment, and we hope that you have managed to secure employment through your access to the workplace (Work Experience and Supported Internships). However, this is not always the case, and some young people with and without additional educational needs and disabilities will leave college every year without a job. If you have got a job, there may be a time in the future where you want to change career or get some additional support in work. The resources below can help you in continuing your employment journey from 'Any Job' to a 'Better job' and into your 'Careers' (ABC) after college.

Employment Support



Searching on your own

Use search engines and recruitment sites to find work. Also check any organisations you would like to work for, social media pages and website, as a lot of companies will advertise jobs this way. You can also set up alerts for organisations you are interested in.

Remember to look out for Disability Confident logos on websites and do not be afraid to ask for some adjustments in your application or interview process, such as:

- Different colour paper for information.
- A Job / Work Coach supporting you (through the Job Centre).
- Specific travel information, or expectations on accessing the building or interview area.



 Let them know you have an additional need, and potentially ask if they would be willing to do a work trial – if you are more comfortable with this.

Continuing to learn while you work

Apprenticeships are also a great way to continue learning while you work and earn. Apprenticeships are available at any age – some people are offered them as part of an existing job, or you can apply for a new apprenticeship role.

Community and voluntary support to access work

Below are a few examples of community and voluntary organisations and how they can help:



SkillsZone: a partnership of organisations, including housing associations, Job Centre Plus, colleges and voluntary organisations which can work together to support unemployed residents with training, work placements and employment. It also promotes initiatives to improve your work prospects and upskill.

Enable Ability: the project aims to provide young people with a mild to moderate learning or physical disability, or an additional need, with the opportunity to engage in a variety of planned activities as part of an inclusive and supportive group setting. This enables young people to interact and socialise with other peers on a regular basis. A focus is on improving life skills for all young people, including building confidence, independence, friendships and developing socialisation, communication skills, and preparing for employment.

Enable Ability - A disability charity based in Portsmouth

As an extension to the project, **Inter Activ** offers a variety of supported volunteering and work experience activities designed to increase each young person's employability skills. They also offer workshops on CV and interview skills working in partnership with local organisations and providers.

Scope: Careers Pathways is an independent careers advice service for young disabled people. Their career advisers will collaborate with you to set you on the path to succeed. You will be offered up to three one-hour sessions with a specialist career adviser to: make you aware of all the career options and the employment routes open to you; develop your career goals and create an action plan to help you achieve them.

Deloitte supports their mentoring programme. Giving you access to free support and advice from Deloitte employees, who will support you to achieve your goals. Minstead Trust Community Support: Support people with learning disabilities to lead more independent lives in the heart of the New Forest. They offer a range of services including work experience, day personalised, training and support, residential care and supported living.



Step Up for Work is a work program for people with learning disabilities, autism and other additional needs. The innovative, personalised 12-month program runs in the New Forest and Portsmouth and will help you gain skills and work experience in a social enterprise. By the end of the course, you will have gained practical work skills, undertaken a work placement and be ready to look for a paid role.
