# All Our Talents: Pathways into Adulthood for Young People with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities in Hampshire

At Hampshire County Council, we want all young people to have the aspiration, opportunity, and support to help them to live fulfilling and independent lives.



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## 1. Introduction

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With our partners, Hampshire County Council is committed to improving outcomes for children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND). We encourage them to have high aspirations and placing a clear emphasis on education and training that supports progression to independent living, community inclusion, employment opportunities and good health.

We have been working with our partners in Hampshire Colleges to provide post-16 and post-19 education that best supports young people with SEND to meet their aspirations and access pathways towards independence and adulthood.

### **A Post-16 and Post-19 offer for young people with severe learning difficulties (SLD) and complex needs:**

As part of our 'Living Futures' pathway for young people with SEND, we are working with local colleges to deliver education and training resource provision to support them to remain in their local communities and engage in inclusive education.



This provision offers high-quality, accessible, and effective learning within Hampshire's further education network, to support SLD and young people with complex needs to develop independent living skills needed to participate and thrive within the college and their community.

Each provision offers a safe physical space that is individual and has its own identity and facilities to meet learners' needs, situated within the college campus. This allows young people with SEND to be included in the wider community and opportunities provided by the college.

Provisions deliver a bespoke curriculum for learners reflecting the four principles of Preparing for Adulthood, supporting young people to progress to independent lives and fulfilling futures.

Transition programmes and activities started in Autumn 2021 and are continuing to roll out across Hampshire.

## Preparing for Adulthood

Preparing for Adulthood, created by the **National Development Team for Inclusion (NDTI)** and endorsed by the Department for Education (DfE), sets out four outcomes, based on what disabled young people say is important to them: Independent Living, Employment, Community inclusion and Health.

At the Independence Hubs, staff work closely with students to explore their aspirations for a meaningful and balanced adult life. Through personalised support, each young person begins to shape their ideal weekly routine, helping them build the confidence and skills needed to transition successfully out of education. The post-19 offer continues the Preparing for Adulthood curriculum, with an increased emphasis on work-related learning and planning for next steps into employment, training, or further independence.

## Eligibility Criteria

SEND Independence Hubs provide the space and resource for high needs learners to attend College in their local area.

This support is available to learners who are entering their first year in post-16 education after leaving secondary education (16 year-olds) and who have Severe Learning Difficulties (SLD) and complex needs. There are also a number of limited placements available for post-19 learners.

The young person, family, Hampshire SEN team and the Hub can then discuss whether a SEND Independence Hub is the right pathway for the young person.

## 2. What does the provision look like? An insight into one of the Resource Provisions

HSDC (Havant and South Downs College, and Alton College) SEND Independence Hub

HSDC (Alton Campus) is committed to delivering a variety of holistic inclusive study programmes to young people with a wide range of SEND needs.

The SEND Independence Hubs are designed around the four Preparing for Adulthood outcomes. This program helps students to develop the skills required and empower them to achieve their learning, employment and independence goals.



## The Curriculum

Timetables are based around the Preparing for Adulthood outcomes:

- Employment
- Independent Living
- Community Inclusion including friends and relationships
- Good Health

Students receive personalised therapies based on their EHCP, including support from a dedicated Speech and Language Therapist who works with staff to implement effective learning and communication strategies.

Most students attend the SEND Independence Hub for up to three years, with some staying longer based on EHCP outcomes. Full-time programmes may be offered to Post-16 students entering Year 12, and part-time programmes to Post-19 students entering Year 15, where this is deemed an appropriate educational next step.

## The Facilities

- Secure swipe in and out system operated by staff to always ensure student safety
- Dedicated drop off / pick up area for students on specialist or home transport
- A fully equipped hygiene room with changing bed, electric hoist and shower facilities with additional accessible WCs
- Medical room for first aid and secure storage of medications
- Therapies room for speech and language therapy (SaLT), occupational therapy and physiotherapy
- Sensory room
- Quiet room
- Sensory garden for horticulture and relaxation
- An independent living suite which includes a bedroom, a lounge and practical cookery kitchen
- Preparation kitchen for food storage and snacks
- Four accessible classrooms
- Social area for students to take breaks, eat lunch and meet up with friends
- First floor staff room that overlooks the student social area for additional safeguarding
- Electric wheelchair charging facilities



### 3. Contact details and next steps

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Each college uses its unique identity and space to create an inclusive and high-quality offer for young people with SLD and complex needs.

Places are agreed between Hampshire County Council and the College. To discuss joining one of the SEND Independence Hubs, contact the young person's SEN caseworker and/or discuss options at their next annual review, alternatively contact the College directly to have an initial conversation.
